

When the Ham and "Sheez" group made an announcement at the March NARS meeting about supporting the troops involved in Operation Iraqi Freedom, we had no idea of the overwhelming support that we would receive. An idea that literally started in a string of email blossomed into a truly special event for NARS and Ham and "Sheez". And, the most amazing part is the journey from an idea to one hundred Easter baskets took only ten days!

The day after the March NARS meeting, our idea was almost stifled when we learned that heightened security measures were limiting the ability to send items directly to the troops. Rather than believe that there were no options, we continued to research possibilities. Schalee Lodge decided to contact the local military bases directly and called Fort Sam Houston. She spoke with the fort's chaplain, who was absolutely delighted that she had called. He indicated that there were ways to ensure items were sent to the troops; however, he suggested a more immediate, local need. Monthly Ham Recipe:

Ham and Apple Rollers Appetizers from Light Cooking

4 - 6 inch flour tortillas
4 ounces Neufchatel cheese, softened
1 cup (4 ounces) shredded nonfat
cheddar cheese
3 ounces thinly sliced ham
Finely chopped apple

Spread each tortilla evenly with one ounce of Neufchatel cheese. Sprinkle with cheddar cheese. Top each tortilla with about 2 tablespoons of finely chopped apple and 2 slices of ham. Roll up tortillas and trim ends. Cover and refrigerate until ready to serve. Cut rollers crosswise in half or diagonally into 1–inch pieces. Yield: Eight servings

DX News "For All the NARS DX News Fit to Print"

The good news is this is NOT April 1st. The month of March is now behind us and many have some decent DX to report. The first half of the month suffered with the SFI going below 100, but the month ended with the SFI above 155 and in time for the WPX contest.

The first report I got was during the low SFI period from a very excited N5AOK. She snagged Ducie on 10M and then turned around and got HH4/K9MDO, Haiti. Then she continued with 6D2YFM, NARS our guys in Mexico, 3 bands - that was fun. That was followed by VK2CZ -Australia; C53CW - The Gambia and A35WE – Tonga. That brings her country count up to five more and she has 53 in the log. She has now set her sights on DXCC. Knowing what she did when she took on the Texas QSO Party, the DXCC certificate can't be far away. I think we will be hearing much more from Anita in this column. For one I'm going to pay attention to her operation; who knows what I can learn?

Al, W5ADF, says the month was pretty dismal, but look what he worked. The new ones this month are: EA9PY, Ceuta Mellinia. on 15M: A45WD. Oman. on 15M; J5UCW, Guinea- Bissau, on 12M; ST2CF, Sudan, on 20M and 15M; VP6DIA, Ducie Island, on 15, 12 an 10M and I show up in online log for all. "Funny thing about Ducie Is. for me was that I worked the original VP6DI in March of 02 on 15M and submitted the card in Sept of 02. The DXCC folks at ARRL gave me a band credit for 15M contact for Pitcairn which I never submitted. The awards listing I received back in Dec. 02 showed VP6 as both Pitcairn and Ducie which was strange ... I think this was at the time the League had the server crash and they must have gone back to an old database. Will re-submit; I hope no one else had the problem. The cards received this month were: 5R8FU, Madagascar; EA9PY, Ceuta Mellinia; CY0MM, Sable Is. That makes my confirmed on Phone 193; sorry I didn't make 200 this month." If you keep this pace Al the 200th country will be in the bag by June. Please keep us posted.

Bruce, N1LN, reports another month of good "band countries." He has been trying to get 160 and 80 meter countries in the log before summer gets here. It looks like he did get a bunch of the work out of the way as he has this list to report: 3D2MN – Fiji – 30CW; 9L1BTB – Sierra Leone – 160 CW; BA4RF – China – 80 CW; DU9/N0NM – Philippines – 80 CW; ST2CF – Sudan – 20SSB, 15SSB; ST0RY – Sudan – 160CW,

80CW, 40CW & SSB, 30CW, 20SSB, 17CW, 15CW, 12SSB; SV3RF – Greece – 160CW; T31MY – C. Kiribati – 160CW, 40 SSB; TI3KAC – Costa Rica – 75SSB; VP6DIA – Ducie – 30CW, 17CW. I think there are many readers out there who wish they had Bruce's beverage antennas. That is an impressive take for the month.

Cal, WF5W, reporting from the white house has a little more than just DX on his mind this month. Cal reports getting STORY on 40 CW & 80 CW. I heard STORY on 160 but too big a pileup for my 800 watts. In addition, he confirmed A35XM, M05DX, SP4R, T31MY. 9Y4/DLl4DF and CY0MM. The best part of the month, according to Cal, was a call from Ten Tec saying the Orion is on the way and should be here April 1 (hope that's not a joke from them). I think Cal spent a lot of time checking out his mail box after that phone call. Cal, next month maybe you can give us an opinion of your new radio as well as the new DX you got with it.

VP6DIA IS.), HH4/N2WB, UA9ORQ, J69MV, KO8HIO (Special Event OHIO BICENTENNIAL), V31MX, UN9L. HU1M, RA0FU, D44TD. New QSL cards: KM1CC, WP3R, KH7X and TI5/KD3TB. I actually documented my DX OSLs and have a total of 20 now! Wow! Just think, in another 5 years at this rate I may actually have 100! They are: Chile, Germany, Kuwait, France. Martinique, Galapagos Is., Grenada, US (whoopee), Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Czech Rep., Aruba, St. Maarten, Costa Rica, Canada, Australia, Montserrat, Caicos Is., Mexico (another Whoopee), and New Zealand. Lee thanks for the fine report and now that you are really active I don't think we will have to wait 5 years to see a DXCC certificate on your shack wall.

Here is what happened at W5PF, Paul. Best DX, 9N7YJ on 20cw for number 321 worked. ST0RY on several bands including 40cw. Also several new IOTA's. Best QSL's, CY0MM on all bands from 10 to 160 for number 320 confirmed. D4B on 5 bands arrived direct in less than a month after a request via email. Al did not want a card, SASE or GS! So there is a confusion to the amateur radio world, who believe that those who use this call sign are from Mount Athos. Many Greek amateurs sayed their views to the Ministry, but they ignored them. I would be grateful if you send a message to the Ministry (Email: yme@otenet.gr) asking them to stop issuing the "SY" as a special prefix, and give it exclusively to Mount Athos, the "Garden of Virgin Mary. I send you my best wishes.

Still haven't figured how to get on 160 meters. Seems that is where a lot of the activity is right now. Strange. Well, Jim, many of us would like to live out in the country with plenty of space for big beverage antennas. Almost nightly, W5UN can be heard working stations one after another on the low band and I can't An exchange of email hear them. produced the reason why he is doing so well. He just moved to a new 58 acre site and has six (one every 60 degrees) 2400' long beverage antennas to hear with. I'm dreaming, but I think that is as far as it will get on my property.

John, W5PDW, sent this report. Got the K1B OSL for a new one confirmed. I had 111 entries in my log for March, WOW! Worked the Amigos @ 6D2 and some Pesky Texans. Had a good month and a lot of fun. Did manage to snag another new one, ST2CF on 15 meters. We had quite an exchange; he turned my call around every way possible; I think I'm in his log 9 times!! Come join the Tail-draggers Lunch Bunch, Mondays at 1200 noon and brag about your latest DX. The Tail-draggers meet at Hooks airport at high-noon for real and it is good food and good company and John thanks for the invite.

Madison, W5MJ, worked STORY on 17 and 40 meters CW from the car in March, no problemo. Going to 7P8 with Frosty K5LBU (World's Oldest Technician) in late July. Plz work 7P9MJ on all the bands; CW only, though I don't know if I will be on 80 and 160. Madison please give us the inside dope on the trip and the band plan/times so we can all work you from a choice DX spot and fill our logs.

Jim, KJ5X, reports that it is not a big month in the KJ5X shack but did get some DX worked including JA7YAA on 40M, 6D2YFM (big time DX) on six bands, KH6BB (battleship Missouri) on 20M, VP6DIA on 17 and 40M, ST0RY on 17 and 20M and ST2CF, A35REA and C53CW on 15M. My rotor controller has gone on the blink but fortunately the beam is stopped at 355 degrees, just about right for 9N and S21. Call. Reward. Now Jim has to be one of the luckiest hams around to only need two more countries, offer a reward and then have his antenna get stuck pointing in the right direction. If I heard one of those countries, I would work him first and then call Jim to tell him. That way you would really be sure he could do it and you would be sure of something because if he didn't work them there would be no "reward" at all. Play it safe!

H.O. now K5CX reports. "March was a good month under the worse band conditions I've seen in years, yet more lies ahead. Nonetheless, 92 QSO's found their way into the log. Nothing exotic, but good 'ol DX. The 92 Qs represent 50 DX entities and 58 DX prefixes. The band breakdown looks like this: 21 Qs on 10 meters, 8 on 12, 17 on 15, 6 on 17, 13 on 20, 18 on 40, and 9 Qs on 80 meters. Highlights for the month include working the NARS boys in Mexico 6D2YFM; then there was the second group to go to Ducie Island, the Sudan STORY group, and the J5 bunch from Guinea-Bissau. The K5CX log: 3G1P, Chile; 6D2YFM, Mexico; 6Y8Z, Jamaica; 8P1A, Barbados; 9S1X, Congo; 9Y4TBG, Trinidad & Tobago; A35WE. Tonga; C56TA, Gambia; CM8WAL and CO8OY, Cuba; D4B, Cape Verde; DJ4PT, Fed. Rep. of Germany; EA8AKN and EA8ZS, Canary Island; EZ8AQ, Turkmenistan; G3WYN and GB4SPD, England; H44MS, Solomon Island; HC2FN and HC8N, Galapagos HH4/K4QD, HH4/K9MDO, Island; HH4/N2WB and HH4/W4WX, Haiti; HK3JJH, Colombia; HP1RIP, Panama; HU1A, El Salvador; J5UDX, Guinea–Bissau; J88DR, St Vincent; J01DZA, Japan; KH0AC, Mariana Island; KH6VV, KH7X, Hawaii; KP4ATF, Puerto Rico; KT6E/KH3, Johnston Island; L44DX, Argentina; LE3CQ, Norway; OA4O, Peru; OM7M, Slovak Republic; PJ2/WB9Z, Netherland Antilles; RK4FF, European Russia; RN0CT, Asiatic Russia; STORY, Sudan; T31MY, Central Kiribati: TG9NX, Guatemala; TI5/AI5P, Costa UN9L, Kazakhstan; V26P, Rica; Antigua/Barbuda; V31LU and V31QQ, Belize; V47KP, St Kitts & Nevis; VK9NS, Norfolk Island; VP5A, Turks & Caicos Islands; VP6DIA, Pitcairn Island; VP9/W6PH, Bermuda; WP2Z, Virgin Islands; WP3R, Puerto Rico; XF2IH, Mexico; XQ3/IZ6BRN, Chile; YV5OHW, Venezuela and ZF2DQ, Cayman Islands."

Here at the KQ5U shack I managed to get two new ones: Sudan, ST0RY, on 20 & 15 CW & SSB and ST2CF on 10 SSB, J5UDX, Guinea–Bissau on 10 SSB. With all the DX contests on this month I played fill in the missing band countries and here are the highlights. 80 SSB: TO1A, Martinique; 9Y4TBG, Tobago Island; VP5B, Turks &Caicos Island and KH7X, Hawaii. 80 CW produced: PJ5NA, St. Maartin Island; DK1MAX, Germany and S50X, Slovenia. Other band countries were: A35XM, Tonga, 20 CW; D4B, Cape Verdi Island, 10 & 40 SSB; EA8ZS, Canary Islands, 40 SSB; AM3KJ, Spain, 40 SSB and PY0FF, Fernando de Noronha, 40 SSB. Near the end of the month Center Point Energy made a long awaited repair on a pole near the shack and cured some long term RFI. Now I only have two known sources to go. But with each fix I have been able to hear better. I will keep you posted on the progress.

This month the SFI started on a falling note and fell to the mid 90's but near the end of the month the SFI was back up to 155. The wizard at NASA's Space Weather prediction for April is shown below.

QUA* George Carlson KC5RCC?

This is fun. I'm getting to know some of the best people and they all belong to NARS ... go figure! My most recent victim was George Carlson, who showed us a little of his knowledge at the February NARS meeting. I'll try to fill in the blanks.



George was born in Chicago, Illinois and after high school joined the Air Force in Communications. He trained at Minot, ND and then served at a boring base in some little island called Johnston Atoll . . . Yes, I know, I know . . . Ask him about it.

While looking for things to stay busy he found an abandoned dark room and since he had received some military training in photography they allowed him to use it. Through this he developed a love for photography and also made some money from the civilian companies needing photographic work after the hurricane, which took down the base antenna. Yes, he did make a few contacts while there, but became frustrated with the pile-ups and it wasn't fun any more. It should be fun, right?

When George went back to civilian life he found a small company called Texas Instruments making calculators and test equipment and worked in their Lubbock office. He began working in their Research and Development Division and kept adding to his technical skills.

He saw a golden opportunity in 1978 and started a company building after-market computers, but found that he was a few years ahead of his time. He then began to look for other areas of interest and found the Canadian Mining Company and ran their Houston Research and Development Group.

He used his expertise in analog design to engineer equipment to report on various minerals and metals using magnetic and electro-magnetic low frequency waves to measure the complex impedance of earth's resistancy. Flights would be made over potential sites to determine depth and location of major deposits.

But, alas, things change and British Petroleum bought CMC and he moved on to other ventures.

He began a consulting company called Geotech Design Services in 1982. This company is still in existence but rather than concentrating on things under ground it is directed above, let's say 200,000 feet. He now provides a service called Differential GPS to Omnistar, Incorporated, using RF to calibrate the locations of GPS satellites for 4 signals on 3 satellites using 22 base stations in North and South America. When I asked if he also provided this service to Europe and Asia Pacific he quietly said, no, but they use equipment I designed.

That statement seems to sum up his career to date; he quietly innovates.

And now on to other stuff . . .

George married Susan in 1978. They met in Lubbock, but didn't start dating until they ran into each other again in Dallas. She is a botanist with a degree from Texas Tech. As you can imagine, they have a beautiful yard and her specialty is roses.

They have two children; a son and daughter. One dog lives with them, a Heinz 57 Corgi/Spitz.

When George was eight he built a one-tube radio for his Merit Badge. That sparked his interest in both electrical engineering and amateur radio.

He has a complete machine shop in his garage and built a steam engine just for fun. His RF lab is one that most would envy.

He first received a conditional General in 1972 while in High School and he used the school's club call sign WA9LWF. He is now an Extra with his current call sign KC5RCC.

It's interesting to learn the different ways that people find enjoyment in this hobby. George isn't interested in how many contacts he has, so my questions about favorite, most difficult contact didn't apply. He really likes tweaking the equipment, finding little ways to get cleaner signals, home-brew designs, etc. He has contributed several designs to NARS that have been available on the web site.

After hearing his presentation on antennas I was interested to know what he had. He laughed and answered, "Nothing at the moment." He did have a screwdriver antenna on the front bumper of his vehicle, but a car in front stopped faster than he did. Since he doesn't do much DX he really doesn't require a tower.

He enjoys the clean signal he receives from HF mobile when traveling using PSK31, low power digital communications method. He contacted Kobe, Japan from his driveway.

George's family members have always been "fixers". His father was a cabinet–maker and together they built a three–bedroom house, when George was 13. He wired the entire structure.

He started our conversation with the statement, "I believe I'm an obsessive–compulsive designer/ builder." Yes, George, you are.
