Bring your own chairs and cokes (iced tea provided).



Your Radio Skills Are Needed

Events officially sponsored by NARS include Buffalo Bayou Regatta (October), SIRE Ride-A-Thon (October) and Sunmart Texas Trails Run (December). Events supported by NARS members include Houston Marathon, MS 150 and Wings Over Houston.

Plan to help with one or more of these events in 2005.

Here is some last minute news on the MS 150.

BP MS150 April 16 & 17, 2005, www.ms150.org

Now is the time to sign up for the MS150! I need to know if you are going to work the event so assignments can be made and motels rooms reserved. If you are planning to work the MS150 this year please go to http://www.houstonhams.org/Register.html and signup. Amateur radio operators are t! he primary communications for the MS150 and provide communications on the entire ride from Houston to Austin. Operators are assigned with several different groups or they are stationed at different locations along the route. Some of the positions are:

Break points – providing communications for supplies and medical problems – Normally a 1day commitment but depends on your location.

Medical vehicles – operators ride in ambulances and First Responder vehicles for emergency communications – This is 2 day commitment MS150 Staff – operators ride with MS150 staff to provide communications for important issues and problems during the ride. – This is 2 day commitment SAG vehicles – provided communications for the SAG drivers who are on the course picking up riders that have mechanical problems or that cannot ride. – This is 2 day commitment Supply Trucks – provide communications for the supply trucks so supplies can be routed to the needed locations. – This is 2 day commitment

NET Control – Net controls operations are set up in Houston, Bellville, LaGrange and Austin. There are two NETS running at all times and many operators are needed to cover this very important position. – This is a 1 or 2 day commitment depending on your location.

Houston Command Post – The command post oversees medical incidents, and other problems on the ride. The com! mand post monitors the ride on HF, or VHF or UHF amateur bands. Medical vehicles are tracked with APRS units along the entire course. The command post is set up to receive calls from event personal and emergency services along the route through 800 telephone numbers to coordinate emergency calls and situations. – You can work from 1 hour to two days. The command post is open from midnight Friday to midnight Sunday. Motorcycle Hams – If you have a motorcycle and an amateur radio license, you can help out with the Motorcycle group that needs volunteers. With an amateur radio on your motorcycle you can be in contract with the action on the ride. You can contact Jerry Irwin, WA0GLD, the Motorcycle coordinator, at F16Jock@earthlink.net

To volunteer you need at least a 2 Meter/VHF radio (dual band preferred) that has at least 25 watts output and a gain type antenna. If you are stationed in a MS vehicle your radio must be easily transferred between any vehicles since you may be moved from one vehicle to another during the ride. Food and sleeping areas (you need to bring your own bed linens) are provided by the MS150 organization. A secure parking area will be provided for your vehicle.

Volunteer hours begin at 4:30 am on April 16 and end around 7 pm on April 17. There will be two information meetings the week before the ride one on April 11th and one on April 13th. QUA* Jerry Whiting KB5VGD?

I just had a long conversation with someone who I thought was a very kind, thoughtful person. My original opinion hasn't changed, but I have since found there is much more than I expected beneath the surface. KB5VGD, Jerry Whiting has accomplished much in his life and has had his cherished wife, Mary, of almost 50 years at his side. Here is his story. . .

Jerry was born in Buffalo, NY to a father who specialized in finance and a mother who was a professional secretary. He considers Olean, NY home, because he spent the most time in that city, both as a child and later as an adult.

He tells an intriguing story about his father and his pipe. They were rolling peas at his grandfather's farm and had stopped for a short break. His father was sitting on the tractor, took out his pipe, tamped down the tobacco and pulled out his matches. He saw there was only one match, tossed it away and put his pipe back in his pocket and they went back to work. Jerry asked his father later why he threw away a perfectly good match. His father replied that if he had lit the match the wind would have blown it out and he would have been disappointed. By making a choice to wait until later to smoke his pipe he had avoided the frustration.

This story reminded me of my father who once said. "If you make the hard choices for yourself in life, then nothing the world throws at you will be any harder." I'll bet we all have memories like that and they make us better people. Following is a choice that Jerry made for himself several years later.

Because of his father's work in auto finance, Jerry's family moved frequently. He attended 13 different grade schools. His father was a troubleshooter and would move to a dealership to bolster their business.

When Jerry turned 18 he was picking up the mail from their post office box. He noticed an obvious draft letter from the Army. He quietly tossed it back in the box and walked up-stairs to the Air Force recruiting office and enlisted. Talk about making a choice!

After a concentration on science in high school he had attended one semester at Rochester Institute of Technology, when it became necessary to enlist in the Air Force. He chose that branch of the service because he had always loved planes. He had built models as a child and even soloed in a J–3 Cub at 16! He didn't get his private license until later in his career when they lived in St. Louis, MO.

He was stationed for a couple of months in Korea, but was then transferred to Fukuoka base in Japan for about one year. He was then reassigned to the SAC fleet at Lockhorn near Columbus, Ohio. He was a jet engine mechanic.

While in Ohio a friend set up a blind date. Her

name was Mary. She was attending Ohio State, majoring in home economics. She was the daughter of a minister and he carefully went through all the proper courtship procedures. He was then discharged and moved to Tulsa to attend the Spartan School of Aviation.

Jerry completed one year and then went back to Ohio to marry Mary (she is quite merry and not at all contrary – that's my personal observation!) and bring her home to Tulsa in 1956.

He received his A/E license and was hired by TWA and transferred to Kansas City. He flew as a flight engineer on the Connie. But, Eastern employees went on strike and they had been leasing the planes and crew from TWA and had seniority.

They moved back to St. Louis and he took a job with McDonald Aircraft. Debbie, their oldest daughter was born in St. Louis, but they moved back to Olean, NY for a position with Dresser Industries specializing in compressor turbine engines.

In 1966 he became a Field Service Representative and remained in this field until he left the company two years ago.

He spent approximately 12 years in the field and then accepted a position in their aftermarket engineering department. In 1988 he was transferred to Houston to manage their southern U.S., Mexico and South American Service Department. He managed approximately 40 people until 2002. They began to ask him about retirement in 1995 but he refused until they offered him a really good retirement package. He is still under contract with them and has assisted with a few projects.

Jerry and Mary also had a son born in Olean, NY and another daughter born in St Louis.

They have no grandchildren, but two SPCA black labs and three cats they inherited from their daughters. They thought the two dogs were boys and named them Amos and Andy, but one is a girl so their new names are Jack and Jill.

Jerry was interested in HAM radio in high school and had a Hallicrafters S42 receiver. His first experience hearing a contact was when he was 14. A neighbor, W2VEP, showed him his shack and made a contact on 20 meters with Scotland.

Jerry was licensed in 1978 as WD5HPE. He now holds a General class license, KB5VGD.

He has a Kenwood 520, tube transceiver which is a good receiver, but he doesn't use it to transmit. He also has a Yaesu 840 HF rig and a Kenwood. He has two Alinco dual band radios, one in his Car and one in the shack.

He has a Stealthy R7000 vertical antenna and a loop. He also has an inverted-V for 80 meters.

He built a home brew two-meter antenna designed after one he bought in Holland.

During his field service career for Dresser he carried a short wave radio, but the antenna he would put up on the building in China would mysteriously be knocked down or the cable cut. This would be explained as phenomena.

When Jerry went to China he was the 45th person to sign the book at the newly opened consulate office in China. Dresser started a hydra-ammonia plant from the ground up. They built the power plant and all ancillary equipment, including a pure water plant. He was in the country for 11 months, home for two and back for eight. There were 57 ex-pats from Holland, Germany, Italy and Spain. When they would travel from this southern Manchurian plain the train would have the windows painted black.

He also went back to China in 1996 in the Canton district. What was supposed to be 60 days became 7 months. He was in Brazil for seven months and Tehran, Iran in 1973, before the fall of the Shah. He spent 3 months in Holland at a steel mill to repair and build oxygen BOF (a process to inject oxygen into the furnace to increase the temperature). He has been from Borneo on the equator to the North Slope in Alaska. And, to fill in his spare time he also had projects all over the U.S.

He and Mary enjoy cruising and have been to the Caribbean and Alaska. Mary wants to cruise the east coast of the U.S. in the fall to see the fall foliage.

They were both involved with AFS (American Field Service), which brought 50 high school age students to live in family homes on the east coast to receive an education in the U.S.

He is now helping John Ellis and Tom Rum with the Redd school. There are children from ages seven to fourteen who are learning Morse code and amateur radio theory. They recently received a radio originally used by the great–grandfather of one of the students. It is an antique and Tom is restoring it.

Jerry and Mary have a collection of 300 old radio broadcasts and they fall asleep at night listening to these programs from the 1930's and 40's. Their favorite parts are the commercials.

Jerry immediately responded to my question about how he would sum up his life with "It has been very fulfilling and extremely interesting, especially the people." Well, Jerry, I only hope that we can add a few more interesting moments to your life, because you sure have added interest to ours.

Well, I did manage to get one card in this month. FP/VE7SV Miquelon Is. for two contacts made in Oct 2004. That brought me up to 225 confirmed on phone. One all time new contact for me was the club station in Kyrgyzstan, EX9A. Thank goodness for a DL manager, I might get lucky and get a card. Well I could go on and on but promised I wouldn't.

Now here is a real treat, one of our YL's blessed us with a report this month. Now I don't consider myself to be one of the founding fathers of this club but have been here since 1998.
