2005 Sunmart Texas Trails Endurance Runs

It was a very good dinner and I got to give out not only the Polo shirts and hats, but also got some of the other Sunmart stuff. Saturday's weather for this year's race was a little colder in the morning but the afternoon warmed up nicely.

The morning crew was Allen KB5UJS, Bill K5ZTY, Jim KJ5X, Jeff KE5FGA, Kevin KD5ZUI, Paul N5NXS, Rob KD5BXZ, Terry KQ5U and Tom KD5EIJ. 

NARS to conduct Tech License Course in May

NARS is offering a one-day study session on Sunday, May 7th for Technician followed by an exam for those wishing to get their Technician license. A Morse code test will not be required for this license. This will be an accelerated course, focusing entirely on the questions and answers given during the test session. The course will be conducted at the Ponderosa Volunteer Fire Hall, 17061 Rolling Creek Dr. North, Houston (one block west of Ella off FM 1960 W). Hours will be from 8:00 a.m. to 5 p.m. Enrollment fee is \$30.00 and will include a study guide and the fee for administration of the exam.

This course can help one attain a Technician license in a short amount of time. Once this is accomplished, membership in NARS or other amateur radio organizations can help a licensee in utilizing the newly acquired privileges.

DX News "For All the NARS DX News Fit to Print"

Seems the big DX catch this last month was Desecheo Island (KP5). This came as a surprise, I think, to all DXers. This is a US protected area that had not allowed any amateur radio operations recently. The two operators, N3KS and K3LP were on the island for work purposes and evidently had the right authority to operate. As they say WFWL (work them first; worry later) I am sure this was a new one for a lot of members and of course, a new-band filler for most. There had been several past operations from Desecheo, but they were a good while ago.

George, K5VUU was able to snag Desecheo on 15 and 20 meters for an over-all new one! Congrats Messr. George! This makes number 305 overall DXCC countries for George.

It takes that kind of dedication to 'get-em' while they are hot! Paul also worked them on 12 meters the next day. After Paul's QSO, the operator said the boat was arriving and they would only operate five more minutes and turned it into a free-for-all blood bath! You saved yourself some grief there Paul!

Even if you're not a band chaser; always work the DXPeditions on all the bands . . . AND modes you can. You never know how your interests will turn in the future; speaking from experience. Especially a location that could become illegal to operate from.

Bruce, N1LN. I got his DX report via email date-timed at 01:26 AM. Another example of DX- dedication! He was up late chasing the KP5 on the lower bands. The KP5 was a new-one for Bruce; so great! He was able to work them on 75, 20, 40, 30, 17, 15 and 12 meters. They didn't have any 160 meter antennas and probably 10 meters was down the tubes!

Bruce's new band–countries this past month; all CW:

40M: 9N7JO, TF4M, VR2BG, LR50U, Z2/UA4WHX 80M: TF3KX, 5Z1A 17M: A22/JA4ATU 160M: ZP6CW

That is a good list of stations to have work; especially anything out of Africa (5Z on 80, A22)

Also the post office brought him some nice QSL Christmas presents in the way of band countries:

ZS6CCY 75M SSB, UN7TX 40M CW, VU2NXM LP 20M CW, CX4SS 80m CW.

You better write a 'thank you' note to the QSL-gods, Bruce . . . Hi!

You know, some of those South American countries, e.g. southern Argentina and southern Chile, are a long distance away; "not just down below us". They can be farther away than some European countries. But, then again, it's a different propagation slant all together.

Cal, WF5W was able to work KP5 on 40 and 30 Meters. His activity was down this last month. Also, he found out that a couple of his wire antennas . . . were down. His 160M inverted L was unusable due to a storm and his 80M loop had one leg broken off and he said it still worked. Cal is still using what he calls, the "magic antenna" (and that is what it is!) He is hearing DX very well with the K9AY multi-loop, vertically polarized receiving antenna for the low bands.

Now he has a new little keyer to play with. "Idiom Press something or other". Maybe he can show-n-tell us at a monthly meeting?

John, W5PDW, the big signal from Tomball worked Desecheo, KP5 with just one call in the pileup. Man, you are killer in those pileups, John. Keep it up and please let me know how you are doing. He had worked another Desecheo station back in 1993, so it wasn't an over-all new-one. Maybe a band-counter, John? Never too late to start.

John received a QSL from K4AF, the Pentagon ARC to add to his special call QSL collection.

H.O., K5CX made a very unusual QSL: K0AAA/ "portable fish house on the ice" on 17M SSB. H.O; up in the cold-country, we called them "ice shanty's". Probably that only counts for some maritime-type award, huh?

K5UO, your columnist, was able to work a few new band-counters this past month. I have spent most of my time on the lower bands with mixed success.160m is "tuff".

Recipes of the Month

Chicken & Green Noodle Casserole (Mary Tyler)

4 lbs. cooked and cubed chicken breast
1 stick of Oleo
1 cup chopped onion
1 cup chopped green pepper
1 cup chopped celery
6 oz. jar stuffed green olives, drained
6 oz. can mushroom pieces, drained
1 package spinach noodles
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1/2 lb. sharp cheddar cheese
4 cups chicken stock
Cook noodles in the chicken stock
according to package directions.

according to package directions. Mix all ingredients together. Put in a greased casserole dish with extra cheese on the top.

Bake at 300 for 45 minutes.

CHOCOLATE ALMOND BARK (Cheryl Tompkins)

one 11–1/2 oz. pkg. (2 cups) milk chocolate morsels 1 Tablesp vegetable shortening 1/2 cup raisins 1/2 cup chopped toasted almonds

Combine over hot (not boiling) water, milk chocolate morsels and vegetable shortening, until morsels are melted and mixture is smooth. Remove from heat, stir in raisins and almonds, and spread into waxed paper-lined 13" x 9" baking pan. Chill in refrigerator at least 30 minutes. Break into bite-sized pieces.

Comments: I recommend Nestle's chocolate, and use the milk chocolate, not the semi-sweet. I don't keep shortening on hand, so I used butter. I usually double the recipe, and it fits easily onto a cookie sheet.

Sausage Balls (Anita Townsend) 1 pound of sausage (spicy if you like it hot) 1 pound of sharp cheddar cheese (shredded) 3 cups of bisquick

Bring the sausage and cheese to room temperature before mixing. Mix by hand or use the dough hook and your KitchenAid mixer on low to mix all of the ingredients. Add a tablespoon of water if necessary. Roll into small balls and bake at 350 degrees about 10 to 12 minutes.

Baked Stew (Jo Nan Carr)

2 lb stew meat, cubed small 1 or 2 tsp. salt 2 sticks celery, diced 2 carrots, diced 1 large onion, diced 2 1/2 Tbsp. tapioca 1 Tbsp. sugar 1/2 c. tomato juice or sauce

Mix all ingredients in a 2 quart casserole. Bake, covered, in a 250 degree oven for 4 hours. Being native Texans, we served it over rice with cornbread on the side.

Mrs. McKay's Shortbread (Laurie Meier)

1/2 cup sugar1/2 pound of butter at roomtemperature2 cups sifted flour3/4 cup of corn starch

Preheat oven to 300. Mix together into a soft dough. A pastry cutter works well for this. Use your hands if needed. Place in two 8 X 8 pans or one 13 X 9 pan. Press the mixture into the corners and bottom of the pan(s). Prick the dough all the way through with a fork. Sprinkle lightly with sugar. Bake for about 45 minutes or until light brown. Cut as soon as removed from oven and then allow to cool.

QUA* Bruce Meier N1LN?

I just had the opportunity to interview one of my favorite people. This individual lives life to its fullest and turns challenges into a good time. N1LN, Bruce Meier, isn't running his life on radio control, even though those toys are some of his hobbies.

He was born in a funny city named "Skinny Key" (sounds like a Bahamas Island to me . . .), but he spells it Schenectady, New York. He lived there through college, when he applied for a job with Digital Equipment Company (DEC). He was the youngest of three interviewed. When it came time to answer questions at the end, in a one-on-one environment, he was the only one to carry the conversation. He got the job. He then went to training for several months on the PDP-11 in Westfield, Massachusetts.

He was involved in manufacturing training and went to Ireland for four months to set up their manufacturing facility.

He then moved to field services. One of his favorite stories about learning how to work with people follows:

He was asked to lunch with one individual who, when it came time to pay the bill, had a credit card that was declined. Bruce picked up the tab. When he got back to the office, he found out that this was his usual practice. It was also how he handled his company accounts payable, always in arrears. Bruce told Digital's financial department to let him handle collecting payment. Bruce stayed on him until he began paying his invoices and became a legend at the company for bringing his account current. It made him mad that he took advantage of him for lunch!

Through several positions at Digital he ended up at Kodak in an outsourcing environment, setting up their intercompany financial and billing software. It entailed parts, labor, phone charges, etc.

Bruce took a couple of weeks vacation to help his daughter Corie visit several colleges. When he walked back into his office there was a woman sitting at his desk! He soon discovered she also worked for Digital in the finance department. She was auditing the program from corporate accounting. They began to talk and get to know each other at lunches and dinners with groups. They discovered that they both loved college basketball.

Their first official date was dinner at a sports bar in March 1989 to watch a Duke game against UNLV. Duke got killed! Bruce had to console Laurie after the loss. Then, in October 1989, they were married!

Bruce's oldest daughter, Corie has three children, Aileen, Amanda and Logan. His youngest daughter, Stephanie, has a daughter, Angelina. They were all in Texas for Thanksgiving. I'm sure it was an adventure!

As we have all heard, Bruce retired from HP October 14, 2005. He and Laurie had purchased ten acres in North Carolina in 2000. They had planned to eventually build a house, put up antennas and retire there in the future. Well, the future is now. Bruce has cleared two of the acres. Construction is beginning on the house and plans are in the works for the "farm."

There are even plans for one or two dogs. Sarge says he gets to interview them when they arrive on the scene.

Their property is located in central

North Carolina near the Raleigh–Durham–Chapel Hill area. They are about five miles west of Chapel Hill with rolling hills and lots of trees. After they bought the property, Laurie's parents and her brother and his family moved to an area fifteen miles from their land.

Bruce was licensed in 1963 as WN2NLR, a novice. He upgraded to general in 1964 and became WB2NLR. He, as I have found many people do, put the radios away from 1970 to 1993. In 1993, Bruce put up a 20 meter antenna and entered a contest. Laurie had written an Excel program to log his contacts. They soon discovered that because she couldn't copy code, she couldn't keep up! She quickly solved that problem by using her language skills to learn code and getting her Tech–Plus license.

When Bruce passed his General and then his Extra in 1996, he became N1LN. Laurie suggested he get the FT-1000MP he had been eyeing as a reward! I'm sorry ladies; I just report it as I hear it...

They currently have two complete FT–1000MP systems, with amplifiers, and all the necessary accoutrements. Two towers with six beams, two inverted L's, a dipole and four beverage receiving antennas.

Their plans for the property are: Three towers (one at 100 feet) Eleven beams Various wire antennas

I asked N1LN what his band preference is and he replied "It depends on the time of day!", at least he was polite and didn't add "you silly person".
