Highlights from the NARS Board Meeting

The regular monthly NARS board meeting was held on May 25 at the Terranova Clubhouse. The following board members were in attendance: Bruce Meier, Jerry Whiting, Paul Frantz, Terry Myers, Chuck Sanders, Lee Kinard, Rob Nixon along with the following guests: Joe Sokolowski, H.O. Townsend, and Mike Lodge. Highlights of the meeting:

- **Programs** Terry reported that the June program will be a presentation on batteries by the local Interstate Battery representative.
- **Field Day** Co-coordinator Mike Lodge gave a brief status report on the Field Day plans reporting that the site and the tent have now been confirmed. Mike also reported that he was following up on the decision reached by the board to hire an off-duty policeman to provide site security.
- Voice Repeater It was noted that problems with the repeater persist. Some brainstorming discussion was held resulting in some possible contingent ideas to explore while the club takes somewhat of a wait and see on how the sale of the building goes and the viewpoint held by new owners and possibly new building management.
- Texas QSO Party H.O. reported that analysis of the logs indicates that 253 of the 254 counties in Texas were covered during the 2003 TQP and that the NARS mobiles alone had covered around 160 counties. He also reported on plans to have a rally of NARS TQP operators on Saturday July 10 to discuss antennas, route plans and explore questions related to the upcoming TQP. H.O. indicated that his solicitation of TQP plaques was going well with six plaque sponsors lined up.
- **VEC Exam Session** It was reported that the recent exam session resulted in one new extra class and five new technician class amateurs.

Monthly Recipe

Crunchy Parmesan-Mustard Pork Chops - (Recipe from FoodFit)

Ingredients:

1 cup plain breadcrumbs

1 T melted butter

2 T Dijon mustard

2 T freshly grated Parmesan cheese

1 T chopped, fresh parslev

6 boneless pork loin chops, about 4 ounces each

salt to taste

freshly ground black pepper

Preheat the oven to 350. In a small bowl, mix the breadcrumbs, butter, 1 tablespoon of Dijon mustard, Parmesan cheese, and parsley. Season the pork chops with salt and pepper. Spread the remaining mustard on one side of each chop and place the chops (plain side down) on a baking sheet. Divide the breadcrumb mixture among the chops and pat them onto the mustard. Bake the chops until they are fully cooked and the breadcrumbs are nicely browned, about 20 minutes. Serves six.

His father joined the National Guard and they moved to Arizona. They also lived in Mississippi for a short time.

But, they eventually moved back to Texas - don't we all! They lived off the Gulf Freeway in a sub-division called Pecan Park. They later moved to their current home in Spring Branch.

Willard's family has three cats and he loves all animals, as Franny can tell!

He was born with 20/100 vision and, therefore was unable to get his driver's license or his pilot's license. His dad had a Mooney and let him co-pilot and taught him how to read the instruments.
